Key messages

- Immunisation is a simple, safe and highly effective way of protecting children and adults around them from harmful diseases before they come into contact with them.
- It is important that immunisations are given at the right age to prepare the child's immune system. Routine childhood vaccinations start when a baby is eight weeks old.

Why is it important?

- Childhood immunisation is necessary to protect all children against potentially dangerous diseases and is known to impact positively on children's health.
- Some diseases are particularly serious in young babies and could be prevented through vaccinations at the right age. For example, measles is more likely to lead to complications in babies under the age of one compared with older children.
- Immunisation not only protects the child and their family, but also prevents the spread of the disease to the wider community.

The picture in Barnet

- Data from 2014/15 show that rates of MenC vaccination at 1 year (i.e. two doses of the meningitis C vaccination received by the age of 1) and MMR1 vaccination at 5 years (i.e. one dose of the MMR vaccine received by the age of 5) are similar in Barnet to rates in England. For all other indicators of childhood vaccination rates of uptake are lower than those nationally.
- The aim across the borough is to increase immunisation uptake and protect more children from potentially serious diseases. Most

Other important messages to consider

- Some vaccines are given more than once. A gap is left between these vaccine doses to ensure that each vaccine has sufficient time to work properly.
- The recommended gap between the doses is only a minimum. If the gap is longer –for example if an appointment is missed– the child doesn't have to start the course again.
