"In to Win" Improving Achievement by Tackling Absence

Welcome and Introduction

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Why are we here?

- Attendance is a school improvement issue: correlation between regular attendance and good achievement at every key stage
- Attendance is an equalities issue: attendance of some disadvantaged groups particularly poor
- Attendance is a safeguarding issue: poor attendance can be an indicator of wider problems within a family
- Attendance is a leadership issue: poor attendance can impact on leadership judgement in inspection; robust leadership of attendance makes the biggest difference



Attendance and Attainment in Barnet



Percentage Achieving Level 4+ in all subjects	74%	77%	81%	79%

[■]There exists a link between attendance and examination performance in Barnet (as attendance increases, attainment increases). With attendance below 90% 74% of pupils achieved a level 4+ in *reading, writing and mathematics*, this increased to 77% when attendance was between 90-95% and 81% when attendance was above 95%.

Barnet headlines

- Primary school attendance in Barnet below national and London averages in 2012-13 and autumn 2013
- Authorised absence higher in Barnet than in almost all other London LAs
- Significant differences between levels of attendance in otherwise similar schools
- Average attendance of pupils in infant schools lower than of pupils of the same age in primaries
- Groups issue eg SEN and FSM



Key figures – Barnet primary phase schools 2012-13

- Attendance range (over five half terms) 89.6% 96.7%
- More than 50 schools below 95.3% attendance (national average)
- 19 schools 1% or more below national average
- 11 schools 1.5% or more below national average (in the bottom 10% nationally and subject to additional scrutiny in inspection)
- 6 schools 2% or more below national average

Conference aims

To enable participants to:

- Understand: the relationship between attendance and achievement, where responsibility for improving attendance should sit, how similar schools have brought about improvement in attendance and where guidance and supportive resources can be found
- Identify: why attendance is poor and what barriers there are to improvement
- Plan: to overcome these barriers and reduce absence

- National and local context: including the link between attendance and achievement, how attendance is inspected and how powers of enforcement can be used
- Effective practice: presentations from Greenwich LA and local headteachers, introduction to the Barnet attendance web pages

- Planning for improvement: opportunities for school teams to work together

- Development by school leaders of targeted attendance action plans
- Review of action plans and current attendance figures during autumn term achievement reviews
- Continued discussion of attendance initiatives in Network Meetings
- Continued development of attendance website to support sharing of effective practice
- Follow up half day conference in summer term to celebrate success?
